

WHAT WILL WE LEARN TODAY?

Home learning: Tuesday 19th January



Literacy: rhyme games



How many works can you think of that rhyme with cat? How about dog? What about your own name? Make up silly nonsense words that rhyme, too. What's the funniest made-up rhyme for your name that you can think of?

Rhyming helps develop phonemic understanding in young children. It gives them an idea of how different sounds fit together to form words and to recognise the patterns in language.





Maths: how many?

Challenge your child to find as many of an item as they can. For example, how many shoes can you find? How many pens? Get them to make a big pile and then count them all out. The grown up can hunt, too, and compare quantities.



Practice counting objects is really important for developing number sense. Counting different types of objects can spark great conversations about the difference between size and quantity (six shoes looks bigger than 20 pens).





Communication and Language



Play 'Show and Tell'. Your child chooses an object that is special to them and describes what it is and why it matters to them. They can tell the story of how they got it and where it came from.

Giving children the time and space to relax their bodies and minds is very important. It teaches them self-regulation skills that we know are critical for learning and emotional control. It is a lovely way to bond with your child, too.
