


## What is the European Union (EU)?



All the countries in the world belong to 7 big groups. We call these **continents**.

## What is the European Union (EU)?



#### Find home! (1-2 mins)

The UK is in Europe! Can you spot it again on this map?

The **UK** is made up of four nations: England, Ireland, Scotland and Northern Ireland. There are 44 countries in Europe.

27 of these countries are part of the European Union (EU). The EU is like a club. To join, you have to agree to follow the rules and in return you get certain benefits, such as free trade and travel.

#### Trade:


Buying and selling things between different countries.



The UK **joined the EU\*** in 1973, but decided to leave the group in 2016. This is what is known as **Brexit**.









## Why are we talking about this?





The UK officially left the EU last year (2020), but at first not much changed. This was called the "transition period."


During the transition period, the UK and the EU held lots of **important meetings** to **decide what would happen next**.

On Christmas Eve, Boris Johnson told the UK that a deal had been made and that some things would be changing in the UK now that the transition period was over.

Today, you are going to be **finding out about some of the changes** that are
happening in the UK, and deciding whether
you think that **they will affect you or not.**




#### First thoughts (1-5 mins)





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
